Lesson Sequence:									
keeg continent c	Lesson 1: Welcome to the computing lab - It is important that year 7 know how to log on, create a secure password, and follow the rules that keep them safe. This lesson has been designed to give teachers time to ensure that learners can do this. The lesson is intentionally low on content as it is the first computing lesson. Lesson 2: Welcome to your workstation - This lesson gives time to introduce the school network to the learners. They will have a tour of the common applications and their personal work areas. They will also learn how to send a respectful email to their peers and teachers. This lesson introduces learners to communication prespectfully online. As with the last lesson, this lesson is intentionally low on content. Lesson 3: Respectful online communication - Learners need to be able to work successfully when collaborating online. Last lesson focused on email communication, but there are lots of other ways to communicate with others online. This lesson digs deeper into online communication and shows learners how to make positive contributions to their online community. Lesson 4: Presenting to an audience: part 1 - This lesson focuses on the skills required to plan an effective presentation for an audience: at also explores the term 'cyberbullying' and the effects of cyberbullying. Lesson 5: Presenting to an audience: part 2 - This lesson is a continuation of the previous lesson. Learners are reminded of good practice for presentations through a 'true or false' activity. They then continue to work on their presentations, in preparation for showing them to the class. Lesson 6: Who are you talking to? - This lesson introduces learners to the concept of people impersonating others online. This can be done in different contexts, but this lesson focuses on people pretending to be one of our 'non-digital world' friends.
