Key Features of Melodrama

Aim: To shock (but safely) Victorian's liked to be 'creeped out', but unlike modern audiences, they wanted to know it was all safe and resolved at the end.

Target Audience: Victorian Adults

Sensational Plots: Themes of murder and love, Hero tricked by villain, Villain fancies heroine, Fate intervenes, Good triumphs over evil.

Stock Characters: Villain, Hero, Heroine, Old Parent, Comic Fool.
