

# Scheme of Learning: Melodrama & Pantomime

## Topic Sequence:

### Year 7: Autumn 1 Melodrama

### Year 7: Autumn 2 Pantomime

## Topic Overview:

This is the first topic in Year 7 where students are introduced to the subject of drama, and the basic skills and techniques used in performance. Students will explore these skills and techniques through the genres of Melodrama and Pantomime, gaining an understanding of the key features of each theatre style and their application of performance skills.

## Lesson Sequence:

The lessons have been sequenced to build knowledge and understanding of key skills, which students will apply through their exploration of Melodrama and Pantomime.

- **Movement:** physical warmups, body language and proxemics, still images, physical tension
- **Voice:** vocal warmups, vocal dynamics and projection, vocal tone, script form
- **Characterisation:** stock characters – types, voice and movement motifs, musical cues
- **Rehearsal:** collaboration, observation, listening, memory, organisation and independent learning skills
- **Performance:** facing front, projection, audience awareness, audience etiquette
- **Analytical Skills:** writing simple self-evaluations – strengths and weaknesses, giving specific examples, explaining points made (saying 'how' or 'why'), using simple subject specific vocabulary
- **Memory:** techniques for learning lines and cues
- **Genre and Style:** Pantomime and Victorian Melodrama: audience and purpose, stock characters, generic plots and structures, cross-gender casting, asides and direct audience address, audience interaction, end on staging. Evaluate performance of professional pantomime.

All topics within drama are sequenced in a spiral curriculum where key knowledge, skills and concepts are taught, revisited and developed throughout each topic to refine and secure students' knowledge, skills and application of drama across all Key Stages.
